I went to St. Paul for the ground breaking ceremony in connection with a new municipal stadium they are now constructing. A few miles away the Minneapolis people have completed their new stadium. It is too bad that the Twin Cities could not have gotten together on a common site as one stadium would have been sufficient. That is the way local rivalry runs. On the way back I stopped off at Milwaukee and enclosed is an air view of their stadium which to me highlights the importance of parking. The Milwaukee Stadium can only be reached by private vehicle or bus.
